HOPE

Christian hope is a theological virtue that provides believers with a confident expectation rooted in God's promises, offering assurance and purpose in life.

Understanding Christian Hope

Definition and Importance: Christian hope is not merely wishful thinking; it is a confident expectation based on God's promises. The first week of Advent centers on hope, symbolized by the lighting of the Prophet's Candle. It marks the beginning of the Christian liturgical year and invites believers to prepare their hearts for Christ's coming. Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas, so usually the last Sunday in November or the fist Sunday of December. The first candle of the Advent wreath is purple and is often called the Prophet's Candle. It represents hope—the anticipation of the Messiah foretold by the prophets of the Old Testament.

This week is a spiritual "wake-up call," reminding Christians to rekindle trust in God's promises and prepare for Christ's arrival. The candle is lit to signify light breaking into darkness, echoing Isaiah's prophecy: "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light" (Isaiah 9:2).

It reflects the hope of Israel awaiting the Savior and the hope of Christians today for Christ's presence in their lives and His eventual return. Many Christians pray for renewed hope and strength to trust God's plan.

Passages from Isaiah and Romans emphasize God's faithfulness and the assurance of hope.

The first week of Advent is not just about looking back at Christ's birth in Bethlehem—it's also about looking forward. Believers are invited to live in the tension between memory and anticipation: remembering the humility of Christ's first coming while preparing for His promised return.

In essence, the first week of Advent is a call to hopeful waiting. It reminds us that even in times of uncertainty, God's promises remain steadfast, and His light continues to shine in the darkness even into this day.

Let's pray to God for continued hope in the light of Jesus, as we await His return.
